Governmental agencies use this checklist to help determine whether the environmental impacts of your proposal are significant. This information is also helpful to determine if available avoidance, minimization or compensatory mitigation measures will address the probable significant impacts or if an environmental impact statement will be prepared to further analyze the proposal.

Instructions for applicants:

This environmental checklist asks you to describe some basic information about your proposal. Please answer each question accurately and carefully, to the best of your knowledge. You may need to consult with an agency specialist or private consultant for some questions. You may use "not applicable" or "does not apply" only when you can explain why it does not apply and not when the answer is unknown. You may also attach or incorporate by reference additional studies reports. Complete and accurate answers to these questions often avoid delays with the SEPA process as well as later in the decision-making process.

The checklist questions apply to all parts of your proposal, even if you plan to do them over a period of time or on different parcels of land. Attach any additional information that will help describe your proposal or its environmental effects. The agency to which you submit this checklist may ask you to explain your answers or provide additional information reasonably related to determining if there may be significant adverse impact.



Because these questions are very general, it may be helpful to read them in conjunction with the list of the elements of the environment.

The Comprehensive Plan amendments will not result in an increased discharge of water, emissions to air, etc. since they only are policy changes, or map amendments and no specific site development projects are proposed at this time. However, the CIP includes a wide variety of projects and a project level SEPA will likely be required for certain projects. The project level SEPA will address impacts and mitigation measures.

Proposed measures to avoid or reduce such increases are:

No impacts are identified with the adoption of the amendments to the Comprehensive Plan and therefore measures to reduce impacts are not needed at this time. At project level implementation, best management practices and adhering to the Federal, State and City requirements for individual projects within the CIP will help in avoiding or reducing any impacts created by the projects.

2. How would the proposal be likely to affect plants, animals, fish, or marine life?

The Comprehensive Plan amendment will not affect plants, animals, fish or marine life since no specific projects are proposed at this time. However, the CIP includes a wide variety of projects and a project level SEPA will likely be required that will address impacts and mitigation measures at the time of implementation.

Proposed measures to protect or conserve plants, animals, fish, or marine life are:

No impacts are identified with the adoption of the amendments to the Comprehensive Plan and therefore measures to reduce impacts are not needed at this time. At project level implementation, best management practices and adhering to the Federal, State and City requirements for individual projects within the CIP will help in avoiding or reducing any impacts created by the projects.

3. How would the proposal be likely to deplete energy or natural resources?

None of the proposed amendments will result in depleting energy or natural resources. However, the CIP includes a wide variety of projects and a project level SEPA will likely be required that will address impacts and mitigation measures at the time of implementation.

Proposed measures to protect or conserve energy and natural resources are: No impacts are identified with the adoption of the amendments to the Comprehensive Plan and therefore measures to reduce impacts are not needed at this time. At project level

implementation, best management practices and adhering to the Federal, State and City requirements for individual projects within the CIP will help in avoiding or reducing any impacts created by the projects.

4. How would the proposal be likely to use or affect environmentally sensitive areas or areas designated (or eligible or under study) for governmental protection; such as parks, wilderness, wild and scenic rivers, threatened or endangered species habitat, historic or cultural sites, wetlands, floodplains, or prime farmlands?

The proposed changes to the Future Land Use Map will not affect environmentally sensitive areas or areas designated for governmental protection since there are none on the properties. Projects within the CIP are dispersed within various locations within the City and will require a project level SEPA to identify impacts to sensitive areas.

Proposed measures to protect such resources or to avoid or reduce impacts are: No impacts are identified with the adoption of the amendments to the Comprehensive Plan and therefore measures to reduce impacts are not needed at this time. At project level implementation, best management practices and adhering to the Federal, State and City requirements for individual projects within the CIP will help in avoiding or reducing any impacts created by the projects.

5. How would the proposal be likely to affect land and shoreline use, including whether it would allow or encourage land or shoreline uses incompatible with existing plans?

The amendments to the Future Land Use map do not impact property along the shoreline. The land use change will increase the density of three lots. Since the property is bookended by multifamily dwelling on one side and a church on the other side, the increase in density will not adversely affect the surrounding area. Projects within the CIP are dispersed in various locations within the community but none are anticipated to allow or encourage incompatible land uses.

Proposed measures to avoid or reduce shoreline and land use impacts are:

No impacts are identified with the adoption of the amendments to the Comprehensive Plan and therefore measures to reduce impacts are not needed at this time. At project level implementation, best management practices and adhering to the Federal, State and City requirements for individual projects within the CIP will help in avoiding or reducing any impacts created by the projects

6. How would the proposal be likely to increase demands on transportation or public services and utilities?

Increase in density due to the land use change will have minimal effect on transportation and public services. The properties are located in an area where services and utilities are already available and will therefore benefit from the density increase. Development proposals will be required to provide the relevant traffic studies to determine concurrency and potential impact to the system. Similarly, drainage analysis and stormwater requirement, in place at the time, will require improvements to meet the established standards. The CIP includes transportation related projects identified by the Transportation Plan which are included to improve transportation services. Non transportation projects, where applicable, will require traffic studies and transportation concurrency prior to implementation.

Proposed measures to reduce or respond to such demand(s) are: No impacts are identified with the adoption of the amendments to the Comprehensive Plan and therefore measures to reduce impacts are not needed at this time. At project level implementation, best management practices and adhering to the Federal, State and City requirements for individual projects within the CIP will help in avoiding or reducing any impacts created by the projects

None of the proposed amendments conflict with local, state or federal laws or the requirements for the protection of the environment.
